#### Read, Read and Read again!

We have just purchased over 600 brand new books for our Y2-Y6 children to inspire their reading and give them more books to choose from - more info to follow very soon!

Please, please, please ensure you are reading as much as you can with your children, or encouraging them to read as often as possible. It is so important that they re-read books as well. We ask that they try to read at least 5 times per week at home with as many of these as possible to an adult.

Please ensure you are proactive in filling out your child's reading diary whenever they read to recognise and celebrate their efforts! The more reads they do, the more certificates they'll earn!



#### Learning this term!

As a brief outline, these are some of the areas of learning that your children will be developing this half term:

Class 1 - In Class 1, we will be learning all about Dinosaurs this term, where they will be naming and describing lots of different types of dinosaurs which will all be linked to our class book of "Harry and the Bucket Full of Dinosaurs." In Science, we will be learning all about plants and the main parts of a plant. We will spend time planting and growing sunflowers which we will watch grow over the term. I wonder how tall they will grow? In PE, we will be continuing our work on balance by travelling across the apparatus. We will be getting creative in both computing and in art, where we will be learning to draw pictures on the computers and to build collages in art. In RE, we will learn all about the Creation Story.

Class 2 - This term we have started the new book "The Last Wolf" which is an amazing retelling of traditional tale but with a twist! I wonder what fantastic ideas the children will think of? The children will be taking a journey back in time to explore the significant work of Isambard kingdom Brunel. We will look at how this man changed many parts of England forever during the Industrial Revolution. We are creating a spark in Science, by exploring electricity: we will be looking at circuits and electrical safety. In PE, we are taking part in team games and ball skills. Music is all about music that makes you dance and computing is beginning our new Purple Mash work looking at spreadsheets and pictograms. Finally, we will be exploring Christianity and the good news that Jesus can bring in our RE topic.

Class 3 - In English, our new class text is the beautiful picture book "Where the Forest Meets the Sea" by Jeannie Baker. This story is told through the eyes of a young boy who walks with his father through the forest and questions what they see. We will be writing non-chronological reports based on the story. In Maths, we will be continuing our work on 'Measure' and extending our knowledge of decimals. In Science, we are exploring the question of "what do our bodies do with the food we eat?" where we will explore the digestive system and our teeth. In Geography, we are exploring the earth's natural resources and sustainability. In computing, we are using our new computing programme called Purple Mash and we will be learning all about digital animation. In PE, we are joined by Rotherham United to teach football. We are also starting our swimming sessions where we will learn different swimming techniques and important life saving skills.

Class 4 - This term in English, we are reading our new book called "Star of Fear, Star of Hope" by Jo Hoestlandt which is a heartwarming yet truthful tale of war. As part of this writing unit, we will be learning to write stories with a flashback. In Maths, we will be learning about angles, shapes and units of measure. In Art, we will becoming sculptors as we study the artist Fernand Leger and recreate his style of work using clay and bold, primary colours to decorate. The Suffragette Movement will motivate and empower the children during their history lessons this term, helping them to understand why everyone deserves the vote and how powerful our voice can be. In PE, children are learning tennis skills and have a special visitor every Monday from Rotherham United Community Team who will deliver the Joy of Movement programme. In RE, we are studying the followers of Jesus to understand why following Jesus can bring freedom and justice. This term is set to be a very busy term in Class 4 with the SATS, class residential to Whitby and much more.

# Message from Heads of House:
